OUR ONLY SECRETARY OF THE NAVY

It only happened once in U.S. Navy history, and to our own H. Lawrence (Larry) Garrett III who enlisted in 1961, and then served on Sea Poacher as a Fireman beginning 12 August 1962, and then MM3 through most of 1963 including the Cuban Missile Crisis. He has memories of this including three months as a mess cook: washing dishes, resetting mess tables, listening to hungry sailors grumble, and throwing trash over the side. On one occasion on a dark stormy night, as he was carrying a heavy trash can topside; passing through Control, COB Vernon Barnett said: "Garrett, if you don't come back with that 's***can' - don't come back!" He says mess cooking was the toughest job he experienced while on board Sea Poacher as there were only two mess cooks during 24 hour operations. And, it did put a slight crimp in his qualifications schedule.

He well remembers the unexpected "REVEILLE" Monday 22 October 1962. The previous evening was spent with shipmates, with a bit too much time spent at the Brown Derby. Shortly after returning to the barracks, they were rudely awakened around 0430 and ordered to report to the boat for a 0500 all-hands muster. There, XO Dick Stafford told everyone to return to the barracks; gather all their gear and be back for an underway at 0600; which was delayed for several hours. As one of 15 submarines departing Key West, Sea Poacher was the first to scatter on the East Coast and went into Fort Lauderdale. Among other tasks one of his was to slap "goose grease" on the torpedo skid as we offloaded exercise shots and took aboard a full warload of torpedoes at night. Larry said he will never forget the red on white rectangular sign hanging on each tube: "Danger War Shot". There are also memories of Georgetown, SC including a Sunday Pen-



tecostal church service with some young ladies he and several shipmates had met earlier; during a raucous hymn TM2 Gerald Joseph sang out quite loudly "praise the Lord and pass the ammunition" - that turned several heads in the congregation! Other memories are of Charleston, where the XO allowed him to take his flight physical at the Air Force Base, and of Norfolk where upon departure CO Kojm opened the 406 orders passing the sea buoy and told the crew they were headed to Cuba. Larry recalls that after departing Norfolk; while running on the surface, they encountered a pretty bad storm. Shortly after assuming the 0400-0800 watch he lost his breakfast into the FER bilge. Moments thereafter, MM2 Larry Weinfurter ordered him to descend into the bowels below to "clean it up!" He said he did not want to clog the bilge strainers which, at the time, to our future SECNAV, seemed quite unreasonable. (He was still green around the gills!) In any case, after completing the tasking; while trying to recover; standing under the main induction pipe - all of a sudden the air stopped entering the boat thru the main induction and a vacuum started to pull in the boat, which was running on the surface on all four engines. Within seconds – with loose papers being sucked into the FER – green ocean water began pouring in through the large air intake directly above. He was momentarily petrified; thinking we were sinking, reached up to shut the flapper valve while looking at Weinfurter for approval. Weinfurter's eyes grew as big as saucers and, emphatically shaking his head, yelled: "No!" Garrett remembers looking toward the AER where EN1 Hal Brinegar was on watch; his oiler had already shut the AER flapper valve. It was, he says, the most frightening moment while on Sea Poacher.

Regards the Cuban Quarantine, Larry recalls, on one occasion, Sea Poacher deploying a Marine recon team ashore through the FTR escape hatch. With decks awash and a darkened boat, they inflated black rubber rafts topside and took off for some unknown operation. He said groping about in an unlit FER was not at all entertaining. Larry fondly remembers the movies/beer on the GITMO barge when ashore, as well as being allowed to complete his written exams for the aviation program at the local Naval Air Station.

Larry earned his Dolphins on Sea Poacher in April 1963. He recalls COB Barnett routinely withholding his liberty card if he failed to achieve 25 points during a prescribed time frame; resulting in restriction to the boat. That happened to him once in Ocho Rios. He remembers at times so many shipmates clamoring for qualification signatures that he actually, on occasion, felt sorry for the harried Duty Officer. He says he enjoyed being tossed from Sea Poacher into the Key West Basin after pinning on his Dolphins. He understands that this practice is no longer allowed in today's PC Navy.

One final memory aboard the 406 was being assigned to the FER and standing Trim Manifold watches, where on one dive the stern refused to cooperate. With a good down angle the stern remained hung up, and the Diving Officer undergoing qualification ordered him to pump several thousand pounds from aft to forward. Nothing changed and finally the COW indicated the "Christmas Tree" showed an after vent still closed. A TM manually opened the vent, and the boat quickly took a massive down angle; descending rapidly. Captain Kojm rushed into Control from his cabin where the contents of his shelves had dislodged; falling on him. He immediately took the Conn, and ordered "All back emergency, left full rudder, blow everything." Those of us there were just hanging on but came out of it.

Larry would not serve on any another submarine. He had enlisted specifically for the NESEP program in order to finish college. Shortly after arriving on board, YN1 Martinez suggested he pursue flight training as a better option due to his age. With Marty's help he applied, was selected and upon completion of flight training received his Naval Flight Officer Wings in April 1964. Larry proudly wore his Silver Dolphins throughout his active duty 20 year Navy career together with his Wings of Gold. He initially served in VP-50, flying P5-M seaplanes; including two deployments to Vietnam from 1965 to 1967 with numerous combat missions. He was awarded two Strike-Flight Air Medals and narrowly averted injury when his P-5M seaplane was hit by gunfire off Cambodia. On another patrol off the South China Sea his aircraft lost an engine and had to run 700 miles at an altitude between 500 to 700 feet which was only made possible by jettisoning everything possible in the aircraft to lighten the load. Larry logged approximately 2,000 flight hours while serving in VP-50 and subsequently in VT-10. While serving as the Undersecretary and Secretary of the Navy he experienced numerous aircraft carrier landings. His fondest aviation memory is landing aboard the USS EISENHOWER (CVN-69) in an F-14. On another occasion; while doing touch-and-goes in an AV-



8B Harrier, the aircraft hydroplaned off the runway at Quantico quickly heading for the Potomac River. Fortunately it safely came to rest and neither aircraft nor human suffered any damage.

While serving as an instructor in VT-10; after 19 straight months of night school, he received his long sought after Bachelor of Science Degree in August 1969 from the University of West Florida. This was followed by his selection for the Navy's Excess Leave Program (LAW); culminating in his earning a Juris Doctorate (JD), Cum Laude, from the University of San Diego School of Law in 1972. Throughout his three years in law school he was serving on active duty without pay, and upon graduation he transferred to the Judge Advocate General Corps (JAG). He thereafter served as both a trial and defense counsel and as a military judge as the war in Vietnam was winding down. While serving as the Force Judge Advocate, (aka "The Judge"), on the COMSUBPAC staff in Pearl Harbor he rode several submarines, both diesel and nuclear. His last active duty assignment was in the White House as an Associate Counsel to President Reagan. He retired from active Duty as a Commander in 1981, but continued to serve as one of nine attorneys appointed to provide advice to President Reagan and the entire senior White House staff.

In early 1986 he was nominated by President Reagan, and confirmed by the Senate, to become General

Counsel of the Department of Defense; where he served until President Reagan nominated him to serve as Under Secretary of the Navy. Shortly after his election, President Bush nominated him to serve as the 68th Secretary of the Navy. He was confirmed by the Senate and assumed the office on 15 May 1989. He served through June 1992. Here he inherited the extremely difficult task of the mandatory shrinking of the Navy/Marine Corps. During his time in office his greatest challenge was to effectively operate the department while simultaneously reducing the Navy/Marine Corps budget from \$103B to \$78B, resulting in a reduction of the fleet from almost 600 ships to 450 ships. During this period he had to exercise exceptional leadership



during operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm; resulting in the restoration of sovereignty of Kuwait. He was awarded the Navy Distinguished Public Service Medal for his performance. (The above photo shows him with President Bush during a Presidential visit.)



As SECNAV, Larry once surfaced under the North Pole while riding USS Gurnard. He also recalls having the privilege of nominating submariner Admiral Frank Kelso to become CNO after submariner Admiral Carl Trost retired. He says he's fairly certain to have made some enemies in the flag community, many of whom thought an aviator or surface warfare officer should rightly follow a submariner at the helm of the Navy.

After retiring from the Department of the Navy, he became a law partner with Lipsen, Hamberger, and Garrett for approximately two years. Then he became Executive Vice President - Government Business with Rolls-Royce North America. Larry is presently an Independent Consultant, having served on an extraordinary list of corporate boards. Currently, he is Chairman of Spirent Federal, and Fincantieri Marinette Marine. Previously he was Chairman of RSI Products, Applied Semiconductors, SKE Support Services, Ultra Electronics, Naval Aviation Museum Foundation, First Support Services, Director PaR Systems, and Trustee of the USMC University Foundation. Larry also is a member of the bar of the United States Supreme Court, Supreme Court of California, District of Columbia Court of Appeals, United States Court of Military Appeals, and the United States District Court of Southern California.

Larry is a Lifetime Member of the Sea Poacher Association, and lives with his wife Marilyn in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley. He continues to be totally active in chairing various board meetings; most recently in September 2017 in Salt Lake City. Your Editor has asked him if he could possibly make our 2018 Pensacola Reunion, not only as an attendee but perhaps our banquet speaker who can relate to us his experiences in dealing with United States Presidents and perhaps other Mess Cooks.

Larry has not declined the offer! Nor has he accepted it! He is very busy as it took months to gather this article on him. He recently replied:

"ACCEPTANCE IS POSSIBLE-SCHEDULE PERMITTING."

A lot depends upon the dates set for his 2018 board meetings that will not be determined for another month of so. Some of these are mandated by the U.S. Government, so therein lies the uncertainty.

THE END OF NAVY PEACOATS?

In the believe it or not department, the Navy plans to phase out the traditional pea coat in 2018, which began in the Royal Navy in 1731, and replace it with a synthetic black Cold Weather Parka. In a Navy statement, the U.S. Naval Institute quotes: "The Cold Weather Parka was determined to be a suitable substitute because of its more modern appearance, light weight fabric and inclement weather (rain, snow and cold) protective qualities/characteristics. The parka was also selected for its versatility in being able to be worn with service and dress uniforms and civilian clothing."

There is some obvious opposition from the manufacturer, Boston-based Sterlingwear, in that several hundred jobs will be lost and the company having potential losses of up to \$48 million. The matter is even being questioned by Congress as part of its 2018 budget deliberations and the House Armed Services Committee is requiring the Navy to justify its decision rooted in protecting the industrial base. There are some who believe Congress has more important concerns to deal with than this issue.

GREEN BERETS KEEP A PROMISE

Taken in part, from the Northwest Florida Daily News on 2 June 2017 by Kelly Humphrey. At Eglin AFB, before he deployed to Afghanistan in Feb 2017, Staff Sgt. Mark De Alencar of the Army's 7th Special Forces Group had a talk with his stepdaughter, Octavia Osborne. The Green Beret asked the 17-year-old, whom he had raised since

she was three, to look after her mother and two younger siblings. There was one more thing, too. "He told me he'd be back in time for my graduation from Niceville High School," she said with a slight smile. "He promised."

Sadly, that was a promise he couldn't keep. On April 8, De Alencar was killed in action during counter-ISIS operations in Nangarhar Province at age 37. According to his widow Natasha, Mark always dreamed of being a soldier. His family has a picture of him dressed up like an Army man when he was three, and the dream came true when he enlisted in 2008. Their first assignment was in Hawaii and then North Carolina, where Octavia started her junior year of high school. Then there was the bad news that the Army was sending us to Florida, right in the middle of her senior year Natasha said. That was hard for Octavia, but she never complained and did the best she could. Her Dad put a great deal of emphasis on good grades, and he believed education was the key to a better life. Not long after Mark's death, a member of an Army care team contacted Natasha and asked about Octavia's graduation ceremony. They asked if the Niceville school administration had enough room for some of the Green Berets to attend. Natasha recalled asking how many, and was astounded when he said about 80. When Octavia heard that some of her dad's brothers-in-arms planned to attend her graduation the



reality of what that meant didn't sink in at first. It finally hit her until she got to the graduation and saw all those men sitting there in the stands. The contingent from the 7th Group included not only the Green Berets in their dress uniforms, but many of their families. When Octavia arrived at the stadium, her special cheering section was already in place. She was overwhelmed. Everyone had taken time out of their busy lives because they knew we had someone missing. They just wanted to let us know that they had our back. As the names of Niceville's graduates were called, Octavia sat nervously. She didn't know what to expect when her name was announced. She thought since they were servicemen, they would be quiet and just kind of be there. But when her name was called you heard an incredible roar from the stadium, and she was taken off guard. Her grandmother was there and said that moment was one of the greatest in her life. When Octavia's feet touched the steps on the way to the stage, those men rose in unison, and then let out another roar, like she had scored the winning touchdown. As she looked around at the sea of men in dress uniforms, she shared a silent thought with her deceased son-in-law, and thought "Mark, you gotta be looking down and smiling down on this one" and she choked with tears. "You had military men who knew what their role was. They reached out on behalf on their fallen brother to let his daughter know they were going to be there for her. It made my heart feel so good, because she had been through so much to get to that day." Mark is at rest in Arlington National Cemetery and was our first 2017 causality in Afghanistan.

I sometimes don't know where I'm going, but oh, all the places I've been, wrapped up in a hull made of steel, with a crew of fine sailors locked in. The missions are lonely and silent, the dangers untold with no yield, but we still climb down steel ladders, the hatches above us are sealed. The sunlight's a far distant memory, fresh air just a dream from the past. The world outside comes in short little bursts, from a buoy or a wire or a mast. Between drilling and watches and work, there's no place to be secluded, surrounded by lights and companions, and pressure is always included. Sliding silently through the ocean, sometimes you forget where you are, until you remember there's no moon or even a glimmering star. They all wait above you in silence, for the boat to once more breach the waves, in a rush of wild water and motion, escaping a watery grave. Unless you're an old submariner, it's hard to know what this means. As age dims my mind and my body, I'm back riding old submarines.
