Harriett and Helen.



Mathew Joseph Byrnes Jr. EN3 55/56



George Graveson LT 1961

George Lewis Graveson Jr. passed peacefully March 23, 2024 with three of his four children and his loving wife of 68 years at his side. George was born on September 17, 1929 to Gertrude and George Graveson of Amityville, Long Island. During his high school years his Uncle Lonnie Kittle, the science teacher and sports coach, recognized his athletic skills and helped him focus on his future including his wrestling career.

George attended Wyoming Seminary for one year before entering Yale University in 1948 with a NROTC Scholarship. He became a member of the "syrink" singing group, chairman of the undergraduate Board of Deacons, and a member of Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity. In his senior year he was selected Captain of the Yale Wrestling Team and named "Outstanding Wrestler" of the Eastern Intercollegiate Championships in 1951. He graduated from Yale in 1952 and was commissioned in the United States Navy. Later, George passed the entrance test to attend submarine school, leading to his Naval Career in submarines.

In December of 1955, George L. Graveson Jr. and Barbara Don Hoeltzel were married on December 28 in Ft Lauderdale, Florida.

George's decorated naval career culminated with his Command of two submarines and the rank of Captain. He was Commander, Submarine Force Atlantic Representative in London, England followed by Chief of Staff to COMSUBMED and Commander Submarine Group Eight in Naples, Italy and his final assignment, Supreme Allied Commander Atlantic Representative - Europe in Brussels, Belgium.

After 31 years in the Navy, George joined CONTELPage engineers in northern Virginia, as a program manager. Later George helped found the US Naval Submarine League,

where he remained for over 20 years.

George is survived by his wife Barbara; sister Lilian; and four children George (Sherry) Lewis Graveson III, Deborah (Robert) Wulff, Cynthia (Clarke) Cunningham, and Elizabeth Wright; two step grandchildren Charles Clarke Cunningham IV and Deborah Anne Cunningham; three grandchildren Matthew George Graveson, Timothy Lewis Graveson, and Abigail Ann Graveson.

Garth Stanley Greene, was born in Webster County, Missouri, on January 21, 1930, and was the 6th child of Lewis E. and Edith M. Greene. Stan attended the Fordland School, in the same building for 12 years, and graduated from high school in 1947. He then enlisted in the US Navy, and married his teenage love, Joan Loveland. While Joan remained at home port busy caring for the children, Stan served on 5 submarines - USS Chub SS329, USS Sea Poacher SS405, USS Sea Leopard SS485, USS Runner SS476, and USS Cubera SS346. He also served on the submarine tender USS Orion AS18. After Stan was commissioned a Chief Warrant Officer he served on the aircraft carrier USS Wasp CVS18 as electrical division officer. His last Navy duty was at the Boston Naval Shipyard where he served as a ship repair superintendent and de-commissioned the submarine, USS Runner, on which he had served as a crew member 6 years earlier. He also re-commissioned the USS Pusan, a destroyer that was being given to the South Korean Navy. While at the Boston shipyard his flagship was the USS Constitution and he stood several inspections on this oldest US Navy ship in commission today.

During Stan's last 6 years of sea duty he served with Task Group Alpha and Task Group Bravo in the Atlantic Fleet. During this time his ship, the USS Wasp, was the primary recovery ship for several Gemini space capsule shots. On one occasion the Wasp recovered Buzz Aldrin and James Lovell, Jr. from their capsule in the Sargasso Sea.

During his service in the Navy, Stan cruised the Pacific Ocean, the Caribbean, the North and South Atlantic oceans, the Sargasso Sea, the Bermuda Triangle, the Mediterranean, the Aegean Sea, and the Gulf of Mexico. He transited the Panama Canal over a dozen times. After retiring from the Navy in 1969, Stan and his family moved back to St. Louis, where he took a job with the St. Louis City Public Schools teaching at the technical high school. He became involved with the Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) and was appointed Assistant VICA Advisor for all St. Louis City high schools. He taught and escorted students around the state to participate in skills contests and he enjoyed the successes achieved by the students. When Stan left the St. Louis Public Schools, he was Department Head and had been advanced to Master Teacher status.

After 10 years of teaching, Stan and Joan bought a farm in Webster County, their childhood home county. They started a beef cattle herd and began raising and selling feeder calves. Stan also took a part-time job with the City of Marshfield as electrical inspector. He introduced the National Electrical Code to building contractors in the area.

This job morphed into Building, Plumbing, Mechanical, Electrical and Fire Code Inspector. Stan became a State-Certified fire inspector and a National BOCA code certified inspector for building and plumbing. Upon retiring from this job after 16 years, Stan and Joan moved to Springfield.

Stan was very active in Veterans organizations and Masonic bodies in Webster and Greene counties. He was a Life Member and Past Commander of Webster County Post 4101, Life Member of the Military Officers Association, DAV, and US Submarine Veterans, Inc. He served as President of the Webster County Veterans Association and headed the committee that brought the 105mm gun to the Webster County Memorial on the Marshfield City Square. He also headed the committee that placed the ballistic missile submarine USS Nathaniel Greene Memorial at Springfield's Nathaniel Greene Park.

Stan was a member of Mt. Olive Lodge 439 and served as Master of his lodge in 1993. He was also a member of Scottish Rite, York Rite, White Shrine of Jerusalem, and Eastern Star. He is also a Sir Knight of the York Commandery #20 Knights Templar.

He was preceded in death by his mother, father, stepfather, two brothers and one nephew.





McCREADY, Donald E. "Don" A Gentleman In The West End Donald E. "Don" McCready of Boston, Massachusetts, Michigan native, veteran of the U.S. Navy, retired executive, advocate for higher education, volunteer for international and local causes and most of all, a true gentleman, died on Tuesday, June 14, 2022 at the age of 91. Enlisting in the U.S. Navy following graduation from high school, Don was part of the "Silent Service" assigned to the submarine USS Ronquil. After

completing his military obligations, he studied at the University of Michigan, earning both Bachelor of Business Administration and Master of Business Administration degrees, each of which he was able to complete using the benefits of the G.I. Bill. Don recognized that his later professional success was due to this education, which would have been unavailable to him without financial assistance. He felt it important to support higher education, particularly for those students who might not otherwise have the means to attend college and in particular, might be the first in the family to do so. Don was a successful business executive in the finance profession, holding various positions with the Procter and Gamble Company in many locations, including, Venezuela, China, Japan and South Africa, as well as its headquarters in Cincinnati. It was a natural next step for him to volunteer with the International Executive Service Corps after he retired, offering his wise and keen advice to small entities in Russia and Ukraine, as well as Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan. While volunteering in Vladivostok, Russia, Don became friends with two American priests who were attempting to rebuild a Catholic parish in that area, including an organization working to find homes for orphaned children. Upon Don's return to Boston, he raised funds for this cause, speaking at various Catholic parishes and conferences. The parish and staff of St. Joseph's Church in Boston also were enriched by his efforts. He was an active parishioner, serving on the Finance Council and quietly, assisting an employee with immigration issues. Although Don enjoyed life, traveling to over 40 countries, it would be safe to say that many of his happiest moments came during his later years, after he met his beloved Carol Murphy. She lived in the same building in Boston and as it happened, was also a volunteer for the Vladivostok efforts. She became the light of his life and he of hers, enjoying quiet times together, as well as adventuring far and wide. Carol died in 2017 and Don grieved her loss until his final day. A Mass of Christian Burial will be held at St. Joseph's Church, 68 William Cardinal O'Connell Way, Boston, Massachusetts on Tuesday, June 28, 2022, at 11:00 a.m.



William reported aboard the Sea Poacher 14 October 1951 from sub school. On 18 February 1952 he was transferred to the USS Odax SS484. On 21 December 1953 he was transferred to the USS Picuda SS 382. No records for 1954 for the Picuda exist. He does not show as being on board the Picuda in 1955.

The only other information that could be located was that he was aboard the USS President Adams APA19 enroute to the Panama Canal Zone on 9 September 1948. His rate was RMSA.

Thomas Harris Payne EN 51-52



Thomas Harris Payne, 90, of Fairway, Kansas, passed away peacefully on the evening of June 19, 2022. Widowed in August 2021 after the passing of his beloved wife of 53 years, Sally, he then also mourned the loss of his 17-year-old dog, Bosco, in October. Marvin Schenker Lt 55-57

Marvin L. Schenker, a New York native, was born April 26, 1928, to Jewish immigrant parents. (He died March 18 2021) Appointed to the U S Naval Academy from New York, he became an intercollegiate gymnastic champion for the Navy. Upon graduation in 1950, he served in USS Helena (CA75) in the Korean conflict.

After submarine school graduation, in 1952, he operated in Atlantic, Mediterranean and Caribbean waters in various diesel submarines. Qualifications achieved included submariner, Navy diver, technical air observer, and submarine commander.

Following a tour as Navigator in 1962 in USS George Washington, the world's first nuclear powered ballistic missile firing submarine, he commanded USS Quillback 1962-1964. Subsequently, after nuclear power training, he commanded Polaris and Poseidon missile submarines USS Lafayette and Nathanael Greene in succession 1966-69.

His efforts in command of the Submarine Training Center, Charleston, S.C., 1969-72 were distinguished by award of the first Navy Meritorious Unit Citation to a training facility. Next followed a tour as Ass't Chief of Staff to Commander of Pacific Submarine Forces at Pearl Harbor, with responsibilities including coordinating all missile submarine operations in the Pacific. He commanded Naval Station, Mare Island, CA prior to retirement in 1977.

Since retirement, Capt. Schenker has resided in South Florida with his wife, Helene. Involving himself in marine related pursuits, he operated a small fleet of freighters from Miami, served as an assistant to the Director of the Port of Miami, and ran the service function of a large marine electronics firm.

Heavily involved in sailboat racing, he collected silver both as skipper of small yachts and navigator of larger vessels. Also occupying time and energy was his more recent landlubber hobby of growing rare tropical fruits (in a salt air locale). 


